They're usually analysed within the framework of Area Studies. Many of the traditional theoretical traditions view the non-Western world, especially the Global South, as either extraneous to mainstream international relations, or as simply an effect of great power, class domination and/or ethnic/racial competition. This module aims to introduce students to Non-Western international relations from the Non-Western-centric perspectives which challenge traditional academic approaches and seek to locate the Non-Western world in Non Western social, political, gender and class configurations themselves. This is an alternative approach which centres the teaching of the non-Western world on itself, rather than exclusively on what external actors are doing to it. This is not to dismiss the influence of external actors and processes, but to reveal the many cases of where this distinction between the external and internal has limited the scrutiny and analysis of politics in the non-western world and its place in global politics.
